
Welcome to our 2017 Praise Book. Here, you will read stories of how God has been, and is, at work among us.



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

SDBC Kids

At SDBC, we value children as God's gift to us. The bible teaches us that Jesus delighted in children, and we, too, value children as an integral part of our church family. Being a united body of Christ with diverse members can be challenging especially in a multigenerational community. However, at SDBC Kids, we see intentional relationships being built across generations. We see the older generations pouring into children and young families of our church. I want to share a unique story that highlights this beautiful multigenerational community:

Kim Griffin is the department head of our preschool room for SDBC Kids. She serves by teaching children at our church, but she also pours into some of our volunteers to develop them into leaders and to make them disciples of Jesus. For example, Kim mentors Sydney—an SDBC Kids leader currently in grade 7—

and invests in her so that she could grow in Christ. Kim is regularly scheduled to serve in the preschool room alongside Sydney so that she can coach her to be a more effective leader. She takes Sydney out to grab hot chocolate every other week—there is a time commitment, which is a significant investment from both

people. Sydney and Kim developed an intentional relationship of discipleship. As Kim mentors Sydney, she shows interest in this young girl's life, she listens to her attentively, teaches, challenges, and encourages her, which all amount to Kim loving Sydney really well. Kim is practicing our vision statement of "Love Like Jesus" by intentionally forming a relationship with this next generation leader. Kim reaching out to Sydney shows us what community can look like when we choose to invest in others; when we decide to love like Jesus across generations. This is the community that we want to build at SDBC so that we may be a community united across generations for the glory of Jesus, our Saviour.

FIRST STEPS

First Steps Preschool has been a part of our church and community since 1999. From the first planning meeting, to the current rebranding and launch of our new website, one thing has remained constant - to love the children and their families just as Jesus loves us. Every week, 30 children and their families are welcomed to our preschool. We are walking through this messy and exhausting season of life alongside these families. With so many preschool options for

parents to choose from, we strive to set ourselves apart from the rest by loving like Jesus. First Steps not only provides a safe, loving, and fun place for children to learn and grow, our teachers model Christ's love through teaching prayer, respect, and acceptance.

One example of this is a young student who was struggling with bad dreams during the night. The child told us of how the scary dreams kept them awake and they were afraid to sleep. We taught the child a simple prayer they could say before going to sleep and if they awoke in the night. To be able to teach a young child about prayer and

Attending our preschool is the child's first experience in formal education, but may also be their first experience with faith and our church community. The foundations being put in place through First Steps can lead to children and their parents attending future SDBC ministries such as Kids Camp,

Young Families, Moments for Moms, and Youth. We want to be known not just as an excellent preschool, but as an entry point for future ministries.



YOUTH & YOUNG ADULTS

It's been a year of leadership development in youth and young adult ministry. His passion for pouring into youth stems from his own experiences participating in youth ministry and the impact it had on his faith. James is the type of leader that prefers to work behind the scenes; putting time and energy into making events, programs, or initiatives happen. He models servant leadership in how he engages as a humble leader.

Philip Grierson Philip Grierson

Philip is 22 and is currently pursuing an engineering degree from UBC. Despite the heavy school workload, Philip serves in many areas of the church, from leading worship on Sunday morning to co-leading Gap on Sunday night. Over the course of the year, he has grown tremendously as a communicator – being given opportunities to speak at Gap and at church on Sunday morning. WOMEN

We have been focusing on leadership development and mentorship this year, and having a blast! We identified four women that we wanted to pour into, and to that end, we have been doing some great things. As a group, we attended a workshop on leadership in the workplace, formed a specific prayer team to support the women, attended the Beth Moore conference together, started one-on-one mentorship, held group

meetings, and engaged in bible studies. These women currently serve in Women in the Word, Moments for Moms, and Children's Ministry. I am so excited to see God continue working in their lives, preparing them to become active disciples engaging in our church, as well as reaching out into the community. Below is an excerpt from an interview with Vania Gallegos-Diaz, Victoria Woeste, Lori Cox, and Kaitlyn Shipowich.

1. What has been the biggest benefit you have discovered about mentorship?

Lori: I always have someone who has more experience with life and different situations that I can count on for guidance and direction.

Victoria: Knowing I always have someone I can turn to who will give me Godly advice and prayer whenever I need it.

2. What would you say to someone considering asking someone to mentor them?

Vania: I always like to encourage people to look for a mentor – it's life changing. The blessing of finding someone that is ahead of you in one way or another is certainly one of the things that helps spur us on to

having a better relationship with God, our friends, and our spouse, etc.

Victoria: I would say it's an important part in maturing as a follower of Christ, so just do it!

3. What would you say to a potential mentor?

Lori: It's such an important role and will make a lasting impact on people in the next generation.

Kaitlyn: Begin with prayer and asking who God might want you to mentor. I think the best way to start is by asking the person you would like to mentor for coffee (or some other type of casual get together) so that you can get to know one another better. When you feel the time is right, you can ask them if they would like you to mentor them. Discuss some potential things you could work on together or what your specific relationship would look like. Every mentor relationship is different and can be designed to fit just what you both need.

4. How has mentorship helped you as a leader?

Vania: It has made all the difference. When I have doubts about a decision, it has been a blessing to have the confidence to reach out to my mentors and get their input, opinion, and wisdom.

Kaitlyn: I can honestly say I would not be where I am today if I never had a mentor. When I was a new Christian, a woman asked to be my mentor and it changed the course of my life. She helped me understand what the gospel is and how important it is, and was such a support system for me in a time where I felt alone and different. Now, as I am a leader in many areas in my life, the knowledge and confidence she gave me has travelled with me and made me the woman I am today.

COMMUNITY GROUPS By Paul Park

In 2016, we enjoyed a surge in community group interest and participation initiated by a consistent emphasis on becoming a community united at SDBC. We currently have twenty-four groups actively engaging in intentional community. The next challenge for us is that our groups are mostly full and we still have more people desiring to engage in real community. With this new challenge, we pray for new leaders to step up and answer the call to lead. Leading entails taking risks and taking on more than what is asked of you, but when you lead others to Christ, God honours you and blesses you abundantly. Listen to this amazing story of a couple that chose to lead:

Upon stepping inside SDBC, we found ourselves at home, welcomed by the ushers' warm greeting, the worship style, and the message conveyed by the pastors, all reflecting God's love. Now that we had settled down in Tsawwassen, it was time to reflect and reconnect. Therefore, we marked the box, "willing to join a community group," on the Hello Card. In no time, we received Pastor Paul's response, checking every detail of our expectation, including the desired language. Later, he confirmed that all the community groups were full.

How about starting a new Mandarin group yourselves? Are you able to lead?

Sounds like a big idea! Is God going to restore those years when we used to have bible study on weekends, lunch talk during weekdays, and fellowship in Shanghai? It took us two weeks to pray about it. Considering we were new to town, barely known by anyone, it required us to take a risk and a step of faith.

God answered our prayer.

On the first week of February–to our surprise–Jim and Shirley showed up at church. We met each other once last year, but barely knew each other. The sermon that day was on 1 Corinthians, and community groups became the recurring theme, which aroused the courage in our hearts. We took it as the Holy Spirit's affirmation. After service, we went up to Jim and Shirley, and Oliver also joined us. We found out that God had put the same zeal into all of our hearts. So, the decision was made quickly-let's start the Mandarin speaking community group.

The first meeting took place the following Tuesday. We spent time getting to know each other, and finalized our curriculum that was translated into Chinese. Though our group is small, it's amazing to see that most of our members have had team leading experience before. At this starting stage, we can foresee the blessing and challenge along the way. UTTAR PRADESH: BUILDING FOR FREEDOM IN PARTNERSHIP WITH DALIT FREEDOM NETWORK

SDBC has partnered with Village Church and Dalit Freedom Network Canada to build a Good Shepherd school in Uttar Pradesh, India, and to sponsor its Dalit (untouchable and outcast) students. Through an English medium education with the Christian worldview, these children can find hope and freedom from poverty and a lifetime of generational slavery.

Last October, we gathered together to share a piece of cake modelled after our school to celebrate the completion of phase 2 classroom construction, bringing our school to 10 classrooms. We continue to thank God for His hand and favour on this ministry and for the generosity of SDBC in supporting this work. This will provide enough classrooms for several years of growth.

At that time, our school manager, Marang, wrote: "We are thankful to you for your loving heart that you have shared with us. It has brought great changes in the lives of many children who can say



that we have a hope in the Lord. At present, we are having 273 students in the school to Class V. It is great to see the children growing in knowledge and having eternal hope in God that they will become somebody from nobody one day. Most of the students are from outcast or rejected people. Their parents are very happy to see their children talking in the international language: English. Loving greetings to all who have been praying and sharing gift donations and great thanks to SDBC for your love that makes us keep moving."

As a completed school goes to Class 10, it is our goal to complete classroom

construction in the months ahead. Know that our Good Shepherd school is bringing village transformation by bridging caste differences, providing a quality education, teaching basic hygiene, providing clean water, encouraging healthy recreation, and influencing the students and their families with the gospel. Through the dedication of the school manager and teachers, students are learning that Jesus loves them and cares for each person, regardless of caste.

ANTICIPATING THE FUTURE

We celebrate the time we had with Paul Johnson as our pastor and we are thankful for the healthy condition in which he left us when he transitioned to his new church in Minnesota. We are blessed with a great pastoral team; well equipped to lead us through this time of transition.

In October of 2016, six months after the departure of Pastor Paul, the elder board formed a pastoral search team. The PST has been working through a four-stage process. The first stage was PREPARATION. This

stage focused on the development of a prayer movement in the church, the selection and preparation of a pastoral search team, and the identification of SDBC's values, purpose, and vision.

We then moved to the DOCUMENTATION stage. In this second stage, we generated a pastoral search package. The package is posted on the SDBC website and consists of a position description and a wealth of information about our church and our community as an introduction to who we are and why someone should consider pastoral ministry in South Delta.

The third stage is the EXPLORATION stage. We are now distributing information to applicants

and receiving resumes. This is a busy time for our team as we meet consistently to follow up with applicants, do our own research and interviews, and communicate with various applicants as to where they stand in our process. The goal of this stage is to develop a short list of applicants for the elders to consider. From that short list, we will recommend a candidate.

The final stage will be ENGAGEMENT, when the congregation will meet the candidate and reach an agreement for the pastor to begin ministry here. Please remember to prepare for change, pray for our search team, and plan to be part of the process.
